PART II : THE EVALUATIVE REPORT

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Pt. Deen Dayal Upadhyay Govt. Girls Post Graduate College Rajajipuram, Lucknow U.P., an associate College of Lucknow University, was established by the Government of Uttar Pradesh on 13th of April, 1997. The College was initially started as a Degree College with ten subjects, namely, Hindi, English, Sanskrit Economics, Political Science, History, Sociology, Home Science, Psychology and Anthropology, in the Faculty of Arts. In the subsequent years, Commerce Faculty and Science Faculty at the undergraduate level were also started in the year 2003 and 2006 respectively.

The Government of U.P. permitted the College to run post graduate classes in five subjects, namely, Sociology, Economics, English, History and Home Science, but, as per the rule the Lucknow University granted affiliation to run post graduate classes in two subjects only i.e. Sociology and Home Science with effect from the session 2009-10.

Over the last 13 years, the institution has developed both infrastructure-wise and added a number of courses to cater to the needs of women of Lucknow and its suburban areas. It was recognized by the University Grants Commission under Section 2 (f) of the U.G.C. Act, 1956 in the year 2007. The College has also applied to the University Grants Commission for grant of recognition under Section 12(B) but the recognition from the U.G.C. is still awaited. At present there are 1863 students on the rolls of the college. All the UG programmes are in Annual System and all PG programmes are in Semester System.

The unit cost of education per student including salary component is Rs. 5284/- and excluding salary component is Rs. 737/-. There are 20 faculty members of which 17 teachers are Ph.D., 01 teacher is M.Phil and remaining two teachers are currently pursuing Ph.D. programme. There are 14 non-teaching staff and two technical staff working in the College.

The Goals of the college are to provide need based and skill oriented quality higher education to all sections of the society for their overall personality development and inculcating moral values among the students. The Objectives of the institution are development of social responsibility, participative culture, leadership qualities, problem-solving skills and sense of religious and communal harmony among the students. Some of the salient features of the teaching methods are (a) e-learning through Audio Visual aids and (b) communications with the students through 'e mails'.

Admissions to UG and PG courses are done on the basis of the marks obtained in the last qualifying examination. The college is represented in the Academic Council of the University by one senior faculty member who interacts with the parent University by way of suggestions and observations in regard to various academic issues and helps in bringing suitable changes in the syllabus from time to time. The faculty who is a member of the Board of Studies plays a vital role in updating, reviewing and re-designing the syllabus and make it more relevant to the society and its needs. The college conducts Workshops and Guest Lectures bringing in academic peers on the existing curriculum. The linkages are utilized for field visits, demonstrations, experiments, project work and on the job counselling for the students.

Empowerment of Women has been the main goal of the Institution ever since its inception and several lectures are arranged periodically on illiteracy amongst poor women, sanitation and health, aids awareness, domestic violence, abuse of women, women rights, dowry harassment etc. on all celebrations throughout the academic session. Fundamentals of Computers and Internet applications are taught through 'O' Level course to the students. Keeping in view the need of basic computer literacy, the

College has initiated basic computer literacy programme for all students with the help of 'O' level course organizing institution in the College.

Feed back about the teachers from the students is collected by using the NAAC format. The College also collects feed back from alumni and parents and the same is analyzed by the college Staff and appropriate measures are initiated to improve teaching and learning based on the feed back obtained from the above stakeholders.

Admissions to the various courses of study are made in accordance with the reservation policy of the Government of Uttar Pradesh. The policy adopted to create access during admissions is as follows: SC – 21 %, ST–02%, Physically Challenged– 03 %(horizontal), Freedom Fighters 2% (horizontal), Other Backward Castes – 27% and the rest of the seats are filled through general merit. As per the State policy, the College provides full freeship to all its students up to the post graduate level.

Based on the academic calendar of Lucknow University the college prepares its own academic calendar before the commencement of the academic session under the guidance of a Committee comprising Principal as its Chairperson and two senior faculty members. Teaching is carried out by the faculty in accordance with the academic calendar and progress is submitted to the Principal at the end of each month. The faculty periodically interact with the students to have first hand knowledge of weaknesses of the students and accordingly remedial, tutorial and extra classes are held by the faculty to overcome the problems of the students. Seminars, group discussions, debates and quiz competitions are conducted to supplement class room teaching and make the learning, learner oriented.

Guest lectures are organized by inviting teachers/retired teachers of other institutions of repute, officers/experts from Government Departments and Vocational Institutions to share their expertise and

practical experience with the students. Audio-Visual aids like OHP, LCD, Video Cassettes, Working Models, Charts, Maps and Power Point presentations are also used to supplement lecture method. Study tours, seminars, internet browsing, socio-economic surveys, project work, case studies and preparation of work sheets strengthen and reinforce the learning of the students. Tutorial classes are held for academically weak students. There is tutor-ward system also where each teacher is assigned about ninety/one hundred students. The tutor interacts with each student and helps the student in case she has any academic/personal problem during her stay in the college.

Faculty members have attended the requisite number of Refresher/Orientation and other developmental programmes stipulated by the Department of Higher Education. The benefits of Career Advancement Scheme are given on the basis of required number of above programmes as well as other academic achievements. 04 teachers attended State/National level seminars, 06 teachers attended three different Training Programmes organized by the State Government, 04 teachers presented 28 papers at Seminars and one teacher published a book in the last two years. It is a State owned Institution, therefore, promotion to the post of Principal is made available to the teachers of the Government Colleges on the basis of merit-cum-seniority. Every teacher has to fulfill a performa of self-appraisal at the end of the financial year on the basis of which the merit/work of a teacher is assessed by the Principal of the College for teaching, academic achievements, extra curricular activities and conduct of the teacher throughout the year and the same is reported to the Director Higher Education for final assessment and gradation.

The Lucknow University does not permit the teachers of its associated/affiliated Colleges to guide research and therefore, in spite of

most of the teachers of this College being qualified and competent to guide research are unable to carry out research activities on the campus. The College is not yet recognized under Sec.12(B) of the U.G.C.Act, 1956 therefore, major/ minor research projects cannot be carried out by the faculty of the College. Apart from it, the College is bereft of any financial assistance from the U.G.C. since its inception and the infrastructural facilities are strengthened and augmented by the funds allocated by the perpetually financially constrained State Government as a consequence of which over all desired development of the College remains a distant dream.

The College is spread over a vast piece of land measuring 11.5 acres. It has a big play ground for carrying out games and sports and athletic activities through out the year. The College provides to the students carom, table tennis, badminton, chess etc. under indoor games and volleyball, cricket, javelin, discus, hammer, short put etc under the outdoor games and sports. Besides, the races and high and long jumps are also practiced by the students under the guidance of a permanently appointed lecturer of Physical Education. Much before the commencement of the annual examinations the annual Games and Sports Meet of the year is organized by the College and the Champion of the Event is honoured with Champion Shield whereas the individual events and team events winners are awarded prizes. The students also participate in University/State level competitions and win several prizes, shields and medals.

The College also runs a Distant Learning Centre of Uttar Pradesh Rajarshi Tandon Open University Allahabad. At the undergraduate level, B..A. and B.Com. Courses and at the post graduate level Hindi, English, Economics and Sociology subjects are available for distant learning. In addition to the academic courses, P.G.Diploma in Financial Management,

Diploma in Health Education and Nutrition, Diploma in Rural Management and Diploma in Fashion Designing are also available for vocational studies.

A number of extension programmes are conducted by the college with gusto. Cleanliness and Environmental programmes are conducted periodically with the involvement of students and staff members. NSS volunteers are given training on Disaster Management. Blood Donation Camps, Medical Camps, Pulse Polio Immunization Camps and Adult Education are a few other extension activities conducted with the involvement of the students and the faculty. Much emphasis is laid on AIDS awareness, environmental pollution and its hazards, Bio-diversity and reasons for global warming. There is a scope for further utilization of student potential for extension activities and outreach programmes especially in the field of Women Empowerment.

The college has very good infrastructural facilities having 12 class rooms, examination room, student rest room, Games and Sports room, proctor room, NSS room, computer room attached to the office of the Principal, 02 students lavatories, 02 staff lavatories, 03 water pumping sets, generator set of 15 kilowatt capacity, 07 laboratories, computer laboratory, Library, reading room, auditorium/seminar hall of 500 capacity for carrying out academic and cultural activities and an administrative block. Post Graduate Block is under construction.

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5.0 : CRITERION-WISE EVALUATIVE REPORT

Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

1.1 Curricular Design and Development

1.1.1 State the vision and mission of the institution, and how it is communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders?

Vision

- To provide a high quality, accessible, enriching education that prepares students for successful careers, post graduate education and lifelong learning in a multicultural, global and technological society,
- · Fostering and encouraging innovation and creativity,

- · Demonstrate mastery of an academic discipline,
- Integrate moral values into their lives and create an atmosphere of mutual respect,

- Create awareness among the students for ecology and environment.

Vision and mission of the College are propagated through Prospectus, posters in the campus and the College website (www.ggpgcrajajipuam.com). Before commencement of the academic session, the faculty and the students are introduced to it in a general meeting with the Principal of the College. Subsequently, accomplishing the mission periodic assessment is made by the College Development Committee specifically constituted for the purpose under the chairmanship of the Principal of the College.

1.1.2 How does the mission statement reflect the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the need of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientation?

The distinctive characteristics of the College which reflect mission statement are summed up here as under:-

- The College has been striving for bringing qualitative improvement in higher education since its inception;
- The College provides access of needy women particularly those belonging to downtrodden and unprivileged class of society to higher education by way of full freeship;
- The traditional values of the College namely devotion to teaching and learning, punctuality, discipline and a sense of mutual respect are practiced to inculcate mission to the students and society at large;

- The College conducts programmes and camps to promote feeling of friendship and compassion among the students and their direct involvement with the society;
- The College is committed to instill a sense of confidence in the students during their three years stay in the College by putting them to various tests and practices which make them skilled in speech and writing.
- 1.1.3 Are the academic programmes in line with the institution's goal and objectives? The College was founded with an aim to provide higher education in Arts, Science and Commerce to the women of Lucknow and its suburban rural areas. It is believed that no education would be worth the name if the instructions in various disciplines are not accompanied with proper shaping of character and personality. The main objective of the College is therefore, to educate the students to become self reliant, useful and responsible citizen of India with positive attitude to make a sensible and sensitive society.

Objectives :-

- · Women empowerment through quality education;
- To inculcate a sense of devotion, perseverance and discipline among the students;
- · To equip the students with intellectual competence;

- To prepare the students for their participation in socio-politicalcultural development of the society with a democratic spirit;
- To instill in the students the quality of leadership;
- · To make the students responsive to the needs of the society;
- To prepare the students for innovation and creative qualities;
- · To strengthen the teacher-taught goal oriented relationship;
- To interact and cooperate with other governmental and nongovernmental organizations of skill and proficiency for advancement in teaching and learning;
- To develop skill of analysis and research to make the academic programmes relevant useful to the changing and globalizing times.

The academic programmes are designed in accordance with the goals and objectives of the College. The College carries out various programmes such as basic computer literacy, holding workshops, guest lecturers, having linkages with different organizations etc. under the extra-curricular activities to achieve its aims and objectives. The curriculum for each course is designed by the University and the College has no direct role in restructuring the courses as per the global trends and developmental needs. However, the teachers of this College namely, Dr. N.K.Srivastava(Economics) and Dr. Rashmi Srivastava (Home Science) who participate in the meetings of Board of Studies, have their say in restructuring the courses of their disciplines.

1.1.4 How does the curriculum cater to inclusion/integration of Information and Communication Technology (ICT) in the curriculum, for equipping the students to compete in the employment markets?

The curriculum is designed by the University and the College has no considerable participation in restructuring the curriculum as per requirement of the global employment markets. However, in view of the growing need of computer savvy students, the College has been imparting 'O' level course of DOEACC to the college students at an affordable fees with the help of a Computer Education Institute, Rajajipuram, Lucknow. The Computer Education Institute periodically holds campus interview and the students so selected are given employment. It is important to mention here that the State Government is giving serious thought to introducing advanced courses in Computer Applications and professional courses like B.B.A. at the under graduate level in the Government Colleges in the State.

The College does not have any significant role in restructuring the curriculum and has to follow the curriculum designed by the University. Whenever any faculty member of the College is nominated to the Board of Studies, he/she helps in restructuring the curriculum according to the wishes of the students whom he/she interacts with in the College.

There is no system of core courses and elective courses in the Lucknow University. The foundation course namely, Rashtra Gaurav is compulsory and the students are required to elect any three subjects at U.G. level in the Arts Faculty. However, the College permits admission to under graduate course in Arts Faculty with certain conditions:-

- **B.A.**: Any three subjects from ten subjects with the following conditions:-
- (i) any one of English and Sanskrit
- (ii) any one of Sociology and Hindi
- (iii) any one of Home Science and Anthropology
- B.Sc.: (i) Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics
 - (ii) Zoology, Botany and Chemistry

B.Com.: No option is available in the first year. In the second year, two options namely, Salesmanship and Advertising and Business Mathematics are available. Similarly, in the third year out of four groups two are compulsory and the students are provided options in the third and fourth groups.

c) Add on courses: No regular add on courses are available in the College, however, the courses- P.G. Diploma in Financial Management, Diploma in Health Education and Nutrition, Diploma in Rural Management and Diploma in Fashion Designing are available in the Distance Learning Centre of Uttar Pradesh Rajarshi Tandon University, Allahabad at our College.

- d) Interdisciplinary courses: Interdisciplinary courses are not run by the College.

No such flexibility is allowed to the students in the College.

The Courses are restructured and designed by the Board of Studies of the University and the College has no direct role to play in the matter. On invitation from the University the faculty members of this College participate in the meetings of Board of Studies and give suggestions with regard to revision of the Syllabi according to need of the hour and students' requirements.

- a) Students Curriculum feedback is obtained from the students by the teachers in their respective subjects only to know their attitude to the curriculum. The University is solely responsible for restructuring the courses as per need of the hour and the affiliated colleges are required to teach the courses prescribed by the University.
- b) Alumni- Periodical meetings with the alumni are held by the College and the Committee constituted for the purpose gets first hand information from the alumni regarding academic atmosphere of the College and they freely exchange their views with the Committee on various things. The University out of its own mechanism finds out the requirements of the students and the teachers of the affiliated colleges are also invited to participate in the meetings of the Board of Studies to give their valuable suggestions based on the feedback collected from their students. The University does not restructure its Courses frequently rather it is done after a gap of five or more years.

In the meetings with parents, it has been generally found that the parents do not turn up in sizeable number on the appointed day and those who come to the College have little or no interest in the revision of the syllabi.

1.3.2 How is the above feedback analyzed and the outcome/ suggestions used for continuous improvement, and communicated to the affiliating University for appropriate inclusion.?

The suggestions of the students, alumni and parents are analyzed at a general meeting held at the close of each session and consolidated report is prepared. The teachers also add to it their valuable suggestions. Whenever the University wishes to restructure or revise the courses the College will incorporate each year's consolidated report in the Document of Suggestions and will submit it to the University.

1.4 Curriculum update

1.4.1 What is the frequency and the basis for syllabus revision and what are the major revisions made during the last two years?

The syllabus is generally revised by the University after a gap of five or more years. However, the University is at liberty to change or modify syllabi as and when need so arises. There have been no major changes in syllabi during the last two years.

1.4.2 How does the institution ensure that the curriculum bears a thrust on core values adopted by NAAC?

The College makes all out efforts to bring about a qualitative change in the higher education imparted to its students although the College does not have any considerable stake in framing and restructuring the courses. The faculty periodically attend the NAAC related Courses offered by the Academic Staff College of Lucknow University and share and practice the knowledge so gained with the students.

1.4.3 Does the institution use the guidelines of statutory bodies(UGC/AICTE/State Councils of HE and other bodies) for developing and/or restructuring the curricula?

The curricula are developed or restructured by the University and not by the College.

1.4.4 How are the existing courses modified to meet the emerging/changing national and global trends?

The University is obliged to modify the Courses to meet the emerging/changing national and global trends. But a pious duty is also cast upon the College to teach the courses in such a way that the students are kept abreast with the latest knowledge in the field and the College has made sincere efforts in this direction. For example, the teachers take the help of internet to have latest knowledge of the field they are dealing with and since not every thing of it can be taught to the students in the class rooms due to paucity of time, the matter is passed on to the students by them through 'e' mails.

1.5.1 What are the quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures undertaken by the institution during the last five years in curricular aspects?

The College has been consistently conscious of its duties to enhance quality in education and sustain it. It has adopted following measures to do so:-

1. Basic computer literacy for all students;

- Ensuring maximum teaching days in an academic year;
- 3. Integrating core values enunciated by the UGC namely :-
- Inclusion of topics National/international relevance in extension education;
- Exposure and training through methodology used for inclusive learning;
- iii) interaction with experts organized for faculty and students;
- iv) Field-oriented teaching and practicum.

1.5.2 What best practices in 'Curricular Aspects' have been planned/ implemented by the institution?

- Quality classroom teaching is the core concern of the college and therefore, a good number of teachers are continually sent to the Academic Staff College situated in Lucknow University to learn and adopt teaching methods they are exposed to in the training.
- The teachers are required to submit progress report to the Principal each month.
- The students are put to oral questioning and written tests through out the year.
- Guest lectures are conducted to keep the students exposed to outer world.
- The students are taken to the places of national/international importance so that they have first hand knowledge of their subjects.

Criterion II: Teaching- Learning and Evaluation

- 2.1 Admission Process and Student Profile.
- 2.1.1 How does the institution ensure wide publicity to the admission process?

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The College ensures wide publicity of the admission process in the following manner:-

- a. Prospectus- It gives updated information regarding the courses offered by the College. All the salient features of the College along with admission process are mentioned in it.
- b. Institutional Website- It provides details of the College infrastructure as well as Staff to the candidates seeking admission to the College. It also notifies the Courses with options available in the College along with entire process of admission, reservation rules, freeship and the scholarships. The Vision, Mission and Objectives of the college are prominently displayed.
- c. Advertisement in Newspapers- The College always remains in the news because of its off campus programmes such as plantation, AIDS control, Pulse Polio Immunization and environmental awareness etc. Besides, some of our teachers are often engaged by media for talks on matters of topical interest. Thus, the aspirants for admission are quite conversant with the functioning of the College. However, the College notifies the admission process in the News Papers of wide circulation.
- d. The College prominently notifies relevant details regarding admission on the Notice Board of the College.
- 2.1.2 How are the students selected for admission to the following courses? Give the cut off percentage for admission at the entry level.

The names of the applicants to each Course are arranged in order of merit in the last qualifying examination and admission is granted to them strictly in order of merit. The rules of reservation for the candidates belonging to SC/ST and OBC are strictly followed and horizontal reservation is also granted to the differently-abled candidates and to the wards of freedom fighters.

2.13 How does the Institution ensure transparency in the Admission Process?

The College is run and controlled by the State Government and therefore, transparency in admission process has to be necessarily maintained. The College notifies the merit list first on the basis of combined merit of the candidates belonging to all categories and subsequently, category-wise list of the candidates in order of merit is notified on the Notice Board. The candidates/guardians have liberty to know their status for admission and the Admission Committee is bound to respond to these queries satisfactorily. The candidates/ guardians can also approach the Principal of the College for queries regarding admission.

2.14 How do you promote access to ensure equity?

- a) The Students from the disadvantaged community are admitted as per the policy of the State Government regarding reservation.

- 2.2.2 How does the institution identify slow and advanced learners? Give details on the strategies adopted for facilitating slow and advanced learners.

The teacher puts the students to oral questions at the end of each topic and on the basis of response of the students they are identified as the slow and advanced learners. The slow learners are encouraged to contact their teachers off the class rooms and the teachers are also obliged to hold tutorials where the slow students freely discuss their problem areas with their teachers and their problems are overcome with sustained efforts. So far as the

advanced learners are concerned they are also encouraged to keep up their advanced learning. They are asked to present papers in the class seminars, hold discussions with classmates and participate in quiz competitions to prove their worth. On the basis of their performances they are awarded prizes on the annual day of the College. The extraordinary advanced learners are exhorted to participate in both academic and cultural inter collegiate competitions. They are provided opportunities to conduct and

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anchor the programmes organized by the College during the academic session.

2.2.3 Does the institution have a provision for tutorials for the students? If yes give details.

Yes. The tutorials are part and parcel of the academic calendar of each teacher. The tutorial system constitutes the core condition of teaching and learning process adopted by the College. Every teacher of the College submits progress report of each month to the Principal in which he/she has to mention the number of tutorials and extra classes held by him/her in that month.

2.2.4 Is there a provision for monitoring of students or any similar process? If yes give details.

Yes. Tutor-ward system has been adopted by the College to keep watch on the progress of the students. The tutorial guardian/teacher has periodic interaction with his/her wards to get regular feedback from them and whenever, any of them is found deficient in the abilities, she is given extra help to cope with her problems.

2.2.5 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students?

The differently-abled students are specially taken care of. Their classes are held generally on the ground floor. The students without vision are very difficult to deal with because we don't have Braille system. But all humanitarian support is provided to these students.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the institution plan and organize the teachinglearning and evaluation schedules? (Academic Calendar, teaching plan and evaluation blue print, etc.) Academic Calendar: The College plans its Time Table before the commencement of the academic session and the Departmental Teaching Schedule is also prepared accordingly. The Principal of the College holds a meeting with the teaching staff before the teaching and learning process starts and the teachers are asked to submit their teaching schedule for the whole academic session. The teachers stick to the teaching schedules and hold extra classes if they feel it necessary. The teachers submit teaching-learning progress report to the Principal at the end of each month.

Teaching Plan: The faculty prepare course modules before the commencement of the session and the students are apprised of it during the teaching learning sessions.

Evaluation: The students are periodically put to oral questions in the class rooms and their level of knowledge and response are assessed by the teachers. The students are encouraged to prepare and present papers in the class rooms on the topics already taught. The students are also subjected to quiz competitions more often so as to make them persistently alert towards their studies. The evaluation also involves assignments, charts, essay and other purposive competitions through out the academic session.

2.3.2 What are various teaching-learning methods(lecture method, interactive method, project-based learning, computer assisted learning, experimental learning, seminars and others) used by the teachers? Give details.

The College practices the traditional lecture method prominently. However, the students are also kept in touch with the modern method of learning through audio-visual aids and they are also exposed to computer assisted learning. The teachers of the College use internet and collect latest information on the subject and the students have access to this material through their 'e' mails.

The education is also imparted through holding seminars, quiz, chart programs and field work.

2.3.3 How is learning made student-centric? What are the institutional strategies, which contribute to acquisition of life skills, knowledge management skills and lifelong learning?

The College makes persistent efforts to achieve its aims and objectives through student-centric plans and strategies. The plans and strategies adopted by the College include:-

- · Assignments, seminars and quiz programmes,
- · Charts, posters and model preparation,
- Participation in debates, discussions and paper presentation,
- · Participation in games and sports, cultural activities,
- · Field trips and preparation of report,

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- Opportunities to develop creative activities and innovative ideas through biennial College magazine-'Abhivyakti,
- Providing basic computer knowledge to the students so as to enable them to compete with fast changing outer world.
- At the time of admission the candidates are required to fill up separate questionnaires that enable the teachers to know their socio-economic status as well as the areas they belong to and accordingly strategies related to teaching-learning process are devised.
- 2.3.4 How does the institution ensure that the students have effective learning experiences?(use of modern teaching aids and Jet tools)

The faculties of the College use modern teaching methodsaudio-visual aids like Over Head Projector, Computer and Video so as to make teaching and learning effective and interesting. Free Internet Browsing facility is provided to the teachers and the students as well. 2.3.5 How do the students and faculty keep pace with the recent development in the various subjects?

The faculty of this College have been given training by the Academic Staff College of Lucknow University to keep pace with the latest developments in their subjects and in turn the faculty pass on the advanced knowledge so gained to the students. Besides, most of the teachers of this College have personal computers with internet facility at home to keep themselves updated in their fields. The College also provides free access to internet in the college premises. The students are being imparted basic knowledge of computer and the advanced learners have free access to internet browsing facility in the Computer laboratory. The Guest Lectures are also arranged by the Faculty to have interaction of the Guest with teachers and students. The faculty do attend National Seminars/Workshops and other academic programmes and present their papers. Quite a few teachers of this College have taken lifelong membership of the National/International journals and they are regularly fed with the latest knowledge of their fields.

2.3.6 Are there departmental libraries for the use of faculty and students? If yes, how effectively are they used for the enhancement of teaching and learning?

Generally the Degree Departments do not have departmental libraries, however, two post graduate departments namely, Sociology and Home Science and four under graduate departments namely, Economics, Political Science, Psychology and Zoology have their departmental libraries.

2.3.7 Has the institution introduced evaluation of the teachers by students? If yes, how is the feedback analyzed and implemented for the improvement of teaching?

Yes. The College has introduced students' feedback and has adopted the feedback proforma suggested by the University Grants Commission. The proforma is given to the students before the close of the session and the students are required to fill it up and submit to their teachers. The feedback is collected from the students and teacher gets the first hand knowledge about him/her from the students. The teachers are asked by the Principal to improve as per the demand of the students.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 How are the members of the faculty selected? Does the College have the required number of qualified and competent teachers to handle all the courses? If not, how does the Institution cope with the requirements?

The college is run and managed by the State Government, therefore, thee State Government appoints the faculty members on the basis of the selection and recommendations made by the Uttar Pradesh Public Services Commission. The teachers are fully qualified and are competent to handle all the courses. The teachers are transferred from one Government College to another as per the policy of the Government of Uttar Pradesh. Whenever vacancy of a teacher occurs it may be filled by a newly selected person or by transfer from some other Government College.

2.4.2 How does the College appoint additional faculty to teach new programmes/modern areas of study(Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? How many such appointments were made during the last three years?

The College cannot appoint any teacher on its own nor it can start any new course without permission of the State Government. Whenever, the College wishes to start a new/modern course it 3

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submits the proposal to and seeks permission from the State Government and if the Government agrees to the proposal, it creates necessary infrastructure along with appointment of qualified staff and thereafter, the College obtains affiliation from the University which when granted the new/modern course is started by the College.

2.4.3 What efforts are made by the management for professional development of the faculty? (eg: research grants, study leave, deputation to national/international conferences/seminars, training programmes, organizing national/international conferences etc.)? How many faculty have availed these facilities during the last three years?

The State Government frames policy regarding professional development programmes for teachers in consonance with UGC guidelines and directs the Government Colleges to send teachers to professional development programmes offered by the Academic Staff Colleges and other governmental or non-governmental agencies of expertise and repute. So far as research grant is concerned the State Government seldom provides it and since the College is not registered with the UGC under section 12(B) of the UGC Act, the College does not receive any research grant from it. In the last three years a total number of 12 teachers have participated in the professional development programmes.

2.4.5 How often does the institution organize training programmes for the faculty in the use of?

- a) Computers: Most of the teachers have the knowledge of computers. Whenever, the teachers participate in the professional development programmes the knowledge of computer is imparted. Moreover, the College has a contract with Computer Education Institute which has its computer laboratory in the College, the teachers are assisted by this Agency in the computer assisted learning as and when they need it.
- b) Internet: Most of the teachers have the knowledge of internet and they have free access to browsing internet in the Computer Laboratory.
- c) Audio Visual Aids: Most of the teachers have the knowledge of using audio-visual aids and they are making use of it in their teaching sessions.
- d) Computer-Aided Packages: At present the College does not have computer aided packages. The State Government intends organizing Computer-Aided Packages in the Government Colleges by way of introducing advanced computer courses in the curriculum taught in the Colleges.
- e) Material development for CAL, multi-media etc.: The College makes use of computer assisted learning and it has future plans to introduce multi-media and ICT in teaching and learning process.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How are the evaluation methods communicated to the students and other institutional members?

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The students of the College are communicated the evaluation methods by their teachers in the classrooms when the introductory lectures are delivered. The parents are also informed of the same in the parents-teachers meetings. The teachers organize evaluative programmes and they involve the teachers of different disciplines so that complete fairness and transparency is maintained in the evaluative process. The final assessment is made by the Lucknow University which holds annual examinations.

2.5.2 How does the institution monitor the progress of the students and communicate it to the students and their parents.

There is a system of annual evaluation of the students by the University. However, the College also ensures continual evaluation of the students at the college level by way of holding several academic programmes throughout the academic session and the students are the part and parcel of these programmes. The parents are also informed of the progress of their wards in the parents-teachers meetings. The College collects phone/mobile number of students at the time of admission so that the students as well as the parents may be informed as and when necessity arises.

2.5.3 What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances regarding evaluation?

The University holds annual examinations and if the students feel that they have not been fairly assessed in their examinations or anything amiss happens to them, they approach the University through the Principal of the College for redressal of their grievances. The University addresses to their grievances and gives them another chance to appear in the Back Paper/Improvement Examinations held in the subsequent mid-session.

2.5.4 What are the major evaluation reforms initiated by the institution/affiliating university? How does the institution ensure effective implementation of these reforms?

The College is an affiliated college of Lucknow University and therefore, it cannot bring about any change in the evaluation system. The University has taken up major reforms in the evaluation system by introducing semester system at the post graduation level. The College follows the guidelines given by the University.

2.5.6 Detail any significant innovation teaching/learning/evaluation introduced by the institution?

The most significant thing in teaching method is communication of latest reading material downloaded from internet to the students through 'e' mails.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

3.1 Promotion of Research

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3.1.1 Is there a Research Committee to facilitate and monitor research activity? If yes, give details on its activities, major decisions taken(during last year) and composition of the Committee

Most of the teachers in the College possess Ph.D. degree and are competent to guide research, but the Lucknow University does not permit affiliated colleges to guide research. Secondly, the College is not yet recognized by the University Grants Commission under Section 12 (B) of the UGC Act and is therefore, not fit for receiving any financial grant for carrying out research projects. Thus, a little scope is left for the teachers in this College to create an environment conducive to research. In spite of these handicaps, the teachers keep themselves engaged in research publications and their personal profiles bear testimony to their research capabilities.

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The Principal of the College has formed a Research Committee during current academic session to monitor the research work and find new vistas for research projects.

3.1.2 How does the institution promote faculty participation in research?(providing seed money, research grants, leave, other facilities)

The College encourages teachers to pursue research activities and allows them free access to the use of internet and laboratory facilities. However, no seed money nor any kind of financial help is provided by the College to the teachers because the College does not receive any grant to that effect from the State Government.

3.1.3 Does the institutional budget have a provision for research and development? If yes, give details.

The College does not receive any budget from the State Government for research, however, development grant is allocated to the College from time to time.

3.1.4 Does the institution promote participation of students in research activities? If yes give details.

At the undergraduate level the students cannot participate in the research activities.

3.1.5 What are the major research facilities developed on the campus?

No major research facilities except free access to internet and laboratories have been developed in the College.

The College has taken initiatives in encouraging the faculties to hold national seminars on the subject of topical interest and a proposal for holding a National Seminar has already been sent to the Directorate of Higher Education for financial assistance. The College is facing financial constraints in the absence of financial assistance from the UGC and other funding agencies.

It is reiterated that the Lucknow University does not permit College teachers to guide research, therefore, no scholar can be registered for Ph.D. at this centre.

3.3 Consultancy

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3.3.1 List the broad areas of consultancy services provided by the Institution during the last five years (free of cost and/or remunerative). Who are the beneficiaries of such consultancy?

The College is run and managed by the State Government and therefore, no remunerative counselling or consultancy can be provided by the College.

Career Consultancy: The students of the College are provided career consultancy services free of cost. The commercial enterprises are roped in to interview the students and if found suitable they are given placements. Career consultancy is provided regularly.

Consultancy for women health and prevention: Under the programmes of N.S.S. the College provides consultancy for health awareness and prevention from horrible disease like AIDS, H.I.V. and Drug Addiction. The doctors offer their services voluntarily free of cost. The consultancy for women health is provided occasionally.

Consultancy for Yoga and Meditation: The faculty of Psychology is conscious of mental health of its students and provides consultancy for yoga and meditation at times. The

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N.G.Os. offer their services free of cost. The Consultancy for Yoga and Meditation is provided occasionally.

Consultancy for Law and Rights: The College provides consultancy services free of cost creating awareness among the students regarding Laws of Land and fundamental rights with the help of legal experts. The Consultancy for Law and Rights is provided occasionally.

Women of the society in general and students in particular are benefited from the consultancy services.

3.3.2 How does the institution publicize the expertise available for consultancy services?

The College provides consultancy services free of cost and therefore, the services are made available to the students of this college only. The benefits of consultancy also reach the parents/guardians through the students.

3.3.3 How does the institution reward the staff for the consultation provided by them?

The teachers of the College are Government servants and at the end of each financial year they are required to fill up a Self Appraisal Form wherein they make a mention of extra curricular activities undertaken by them during the year and their performances are evaluated by the Principal of the College. The Principal along with his confidential comments sends the Self Appraisal Forms to the Director Higher Education for final assessment of each teacher. The teachers are categorized as excellent, very good, good, ordinary and bad according to their performances throughout the year. The teachers who go on earning excellent or very good categories consistently they are promoted to the post of Principal as and when they fall in the eligibility criterion for selection/promotion to the post of Principal.

3.3.5 How does the institution utilize the revenue generated through consultancy services?

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities? (NSS, N.C.C., YRC and other NGOs)

The College has two units of N.S.S. with which two hundred students are registered. The students who participate in the N.S.S. programmes and attend special camps they are given weightage in admission to B.Ed. and other courses of the University. In addition to it, the students of the College are also enrolled as 'Rangers' who also participate in the activities for community welfare. The teachers who are appointed as Programme Officers in these activities, are paid remuneration.

3.4.2 What are the outreach programmes organized by the institution? How are they integrated with the academic curricula?

The College has two units of N.S.S. comprising two hundred students. Under the banner of N.S.S. the College organizes the following programmes:-

- Literacy Programme for poor and unprivileged,
- Sanitation and health programme in the slum areas,
- Awareness programme regarding social evils- domestic violence, drug addiction, dowry,
- Environmental programmes for creating awareness among the people for protection of environment, The programmes in one way or the other are the parts of academic curricula about which the students are taught in the class rooms but these programmes afford them experience based inculcation.

3.4.3 How does the institution promote college-neighbourhood network in which students acquire attitude for service and training, contributive to community development?

With a holistic approach to development, the College promotes college-neighbourhood network through the extension programmes. The College undertakes those programmes which are highlighted by the governmental and non-governmental organizations. Under the banner of NSS the students are continually exposed to social problems and during the course of their stay in the College they acquire attitude and skill to serve the community.

3.4.4 What are initiatives taken by the institution to have a partnership with University/Research institutions/Industries/NGOs etc. for extension activities?

The College takes the help of governmental and nongovernmental organizations in carrying out extension activities. The officials from the Department of Forest and other environmentalists engaged in the work of protection of environment are invited to interact with the students. Similarly, the sanitation and health programmes are carried out with the help of the Officers of the Department of Medical and Health; social evils eradication programme is carried out with the help of social activists/N.G.O.- U.P. Vijnan Manch, Forensic Science Development Society etc. of repute. The University Coordinator of NSS supervises and guides the extension activities undertaken under NSS

3.4.5 How has the local community benefited by the institution? (Contribution of the institution through various extension activities, outreach programmes, partnering with NGOs and GOs.)

The extension activities and outreach programmes carried out by the College in its neighbourhood have desired impact on the people with whom the students of this College interact. The students of this College go to slum areas and create awareness in the slum dwellers to keep their surroundings clean and send their children to schools and the results are encouraging. The students provided school kits to the needy children and they started going to schools. Similarly, the students during their interaction with them have succeeded in convincing them to desist from domestic violence and different types of addiction. As regards Pulse Polio programme these people have responded positively. These extension activities are carried out with the help of the governmental and non-governmental organizations.

3.4.6 How has the institution involved the community in its extension activities? (Community participation in institutional development, institution-community networking etc.)

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The College involves the community of its neighbourhood in the extension activities in the following manner:-

- When any extension activity or outreach programme is undertaken the local people are first taken into confidence and they happily extend help in carrying out these activities.
- The community provides venues for carrying out extension activities.
- · The community participates in the extension activities.
- The community also supports institutional development.

3.4.7 Any awards or recognition received by the faculty/students/ Institution for the extension activities?

Yes. The students of this College have earned acclaim for the extra curricular/ curricular activities. In an Essay Competition organized by the affiliated Colleges Sumaira Siddiqui got first prize. At Lucknow Mahotsava a student of this College was awarded first prize in a classical dance competition. Many other students also participated in the extension activities and got encouraging response from the community.

- (f) Consultancy: For Consultancy the College has linkages with governmental and non-governmental organizations, persons of skill and expertise are also invited to interact with the students and teachers of the College. Thus, the College is directly benefited from consultancy.

The faculty of the College have publication of books, research papers and articles to their credit.

(i) Student Placement: The College organizes career counselling and commercial enterprises are roped in to interview the students and give them placements. The number of placements is not encouraging but it certainly has positive impact on the development of the College.

- It publishes fee structure which is entirely reimbursed by the State Government as per its policy of free women education. The students study free of cost;

- It provides information regarding the Games and Sports facilities.

As per the policy of the State Government the education to women is all free up to the level of post graduation. Besides, the scholarships to the candidates belonging to general category having annual income below Rs. 1 lac, the candidates belonging to SC/ST and to OBC are not included in the creamy layer. Thus, majority of the students is financially helped by the State Government in one way or the other leaving no scope for any other financial assistance to be given to the students. There is a poor student fund in the college but the students who are eligible to an aid from it are already covered under the above schemes. Other than the Government sponsored financial assistance there is no provision of any other scholarship in the College.

The College ensures safety and security of its assets by deputing a night watchman. The Police Station is situated hardly at a distance of two hundred yards from the college. If any problem arises the College informs the Police Station and the police force takes care of it. Since the College is run and managed by the State Government therefore, assets of the College are the assets of the State Government.

The alumni have been persistently making efforts to get the College upgraded to Post Graduate level and ultimately, the State Government conceded to their demand and granted permission to start M.A. classes in five subjects-English, History, Sociology, Economics and Home Science. Out of these five subjects the

University has granted affiliation to two subjects only i.e. Home Science and Sociology in furtherance of which the College has started M.A. Classes in these subjects from the session 2009-10. Apart from it the alumni association helps a lot in organizing the extension activities and gives valuable suggestions for development of the College. In fact, they act as link between the College and the community.

- The delinquent faculty members face disciplinary action from him and he has the power to get the teacher shifted to some other college;
- The Principal has direct communication with the students, parents and alumni to receive feedback and act accordingly;
- · He controls finances of the College.

The Principal is the Head of the institution and he allows freedom to the faculty in carrying out curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities in the College. The Departmental Heads and the faculty in general decide which books, equipments are to be purchased. On the basis of recommendations made by various Committees, the Principal takes decision with regard to implementing the same. Similarly, the non-teaching staff discharges its duties as assigned. Thus, the power of running the institution is decentralized. All the same, the Principal is accountable to the State Government for maintaining academic, administrative and financial discipline in the College.

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Yes. The information gathered through feedback is considered as basis for future planning for development of the College. For example, the feedback from the students revealed that there must be basic computer literacy programme for the students free of cost in furtherance of which the College has started the basic computer literacy programme for the students free of cost and this is being done with the professional assistance from the Computer Education Institute with which the College has MoU. There are several other activities which have been undertaken by the College or by the faculty to bring about changes in the past practices.

The faculty of the College have attended various courses, training programmes conducted by Academic Staff College at Lucknow University and by the Governmental or non-governmental agencies at Administrative Training Institute, Lucknow. As detailed herein above, the teachers after coming back from attending such courses/training programmes share the knowledge so gained with the students. The teachers also attend seminars and refresher courses from time to time and always share their research and analytical acumen with the students. Discussions are held periodically, the students and other faculty members

participate in the discussion to widen the horizon of thinking and experiences.

The Principal has direct communication with the students and alumni and the feedback is translated into the action by him.

The College is run and managed by the State Government and therefore, the faculty and the staff enjoy all those welfare schemes that are made available by the State Government to its employees from time to time.

The State Government allows the faculty to take study leave and go in for research both in India and abroad.

6.4.6 How do you assess the needs of the faculty development? Has the institution conducted any staff development programmes for skill up-gradation and training of the staff? If yes, give details.

The faculty are given proforma designed by the Directorate of Higher Education for self appraisal and obviously, in case the requirements given therein are not met by a teacher and is found lacking in desired attainments he/she is then encouraged to fulfill that requirement as soon as possible by attending Refresher/ Orientation Courses. A teacher who does not possess Ph.D. is required to attain the qualification as soon as possible or else he/she will be deprived of the benefits awarded in the Career Advancement Scheme. The College has not yet extended the benefit of training programmes to the non-teaching staff.

As far as possible and subject to availability of infrastructure and funds the faculty are provided the following:-

The College makes persistent efforts to maintain quality in higher education. It adopts the following measures:-

- The teachers are required to submit their departmental time table as well as academic calendars to the Principal in the beginning;
- The students are also informed about the academic calendar beforehand;
- A Quality Assurance Cell consisting of senior and quality conscious teachers, is constituted by the Principal which is required to monitor and continually evaluate the progress of curricular, cocurricular and extra curricular activities undertaken by a teacher.
- The teachers attend academic/administrative training programmes organized by the Academic Staff College, Lucknow University and practice innovations in teaching and learning;
- The teachers are required to submit their academic progress to the Principal each month;
- Tutor-ward system is adopted to regularly take feedback from the students and remedy their problems and difficulties;
- Linkages with NGOs and other Developmental organizations;
- Increased use of ICT in governance assured

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7.12 What are the functions carried out by the above mechanisms in the quality enhancement of the institution?

The mechanisms for quality enhancement work are adopted by the College in the following manner:-

- The preparation of academic calendar by a teacher ensures methodical, comprehensive and time bound teaching-learning process;
- Internal Quality Assurance Cell provides academic leadership to the young and innovative staff as well as to the students;
- Internal Quality Assurance Cell ensures carrying out curricular,
 co-curricular and extra curricular activities in the College by
 keeping direct contact with the teachers as well as students;
- The teachers have regular feed back from the students and they hold remedial lectures for the weaker students;
- Tutor-ward system is very effective in dealing with the students and keeping them informed about academic and non-academic activities in the College and it also ensures all round development of the students;
- The linkages with the NGOs. and other developmental agencies are very useful in bringing about qualitative change in the academic environment of the College. The persons of skill and expertise are invited by the faculty and by interaction with the students they provide exposure to the outer world;
- In order to manage the mental stress of the students, cocurricular and extra curricular activities are carried out by the College. The students are encouraged to participate in these activities so that mission, vision and objectives of the College are achieved;

- Regular assessment of performance of the students by holding papers presentations, essay writings, debates, elocutions, seminars and quiz etc. give impetus to quality enhancement;
- The students are provided with basic knowledge of computers and through 'e' mails they are supplied with plenty of material downloaded by their teachers from internet;
- The increased use of ICT in teaching and learning assured from the next session;
- The developmental programmes/training programmes are imparted to the faculty to keep them abreast with the innovative techniques in teaching and latest development in their fields.

7.1.3 What role is played by students in assuring quality of education imparted by the institution?

The students are directly involved in the curricular, cocurricular and extra curricular activities carried out by the College and they play an important role in maintaining quality in education imparted by the College.

- The academic/developmental programmes planned by the College are students oriented and the students are exposed to the world of knowledge and experience.
- The continuous teaching-learning process, regular feed back from the students and their parents/guardians and the evaluative programmes carried out with direct involvements of the students enhance quality in education imparted by the College.
- The responsive students are the steel anchor of the College because they win laurels to the College by participating in the academic and extra curricular activities at the College, University and State level.

7.14 What initiatives have been taken up by the institution to promote best practices in the institution? How does the institution ensure that the best practices have been internalized?

The College is widely awake to and fully conscious of its duties to the community it serves and internalizes spiritedly and with great devotion the best practices to achieve its goals and objectives. The best practices are promoted in the following manner:-

- The Principal, who is academic and administrative head of the College identifies priorities and the faculty are instructed to devise their plans accordingly;
- The plans and schedules related to teaching and learning are submitted in writing to the Principal before commencement of the session;
- The progress report of teaching-learning process is submitted by the faculty to the Principal each month for evaluation;
- The Quality Assurance Cell which consists of senior teachers, monitors involvement of faculty and students and ensures that the teaching-learning process is strictly adhered to the schedules;
- · The tutor-ward system is effectively managed;

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- The Grievance-redressal Cell remains watchful and promptly redresses the problems/difficulties of the students;
- The students have easy access to the Principal who gets direct feed back from the students regularly;
- The students are encouraged to participate in the curricular, cocurricular and extra curricular activities of the College by awarding them prizes in the annual function;
- The teachers are sent to various academic/ administrative/ management training programmes organized by the Academic

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Staff College and other governmental and non-governmental agencies to keep them in pace with the global changes in the academics;

- The Principal monitors the development continually throughout the academic session and any lapse on the part of faculty is taken note of;
- The parents-teachers meets ensure that the students come to the College regularly and take lively interest in its activities;
- There is a system of submission of self appraisal report by the faculty to be evaluated annually by the Principal and sent to the Director Higher Education for making final entries in their character rolls;
- The Principal evaluates the self appraisal reports and categorizes the faculty by awarding them excellent, very good, good or bad according to their performances throughout the year;
- The self appraisal system keeps the teachers watchful and alert on their jobs.

7.1.5 In which way has the institution added value to the quality enhancement of students?

The values are added to the quality enhancement practices in the College by:-

- directing the curricular, co-curricular and extra curricular activities towards value addition;
- inducting basic computer literacy programme for all students;
- making the students learn through 'e' communications;
- emphasizing on ICT practices in teaching-learning process;
- encouraging the students for using internet in the College;
- making the students quality and career conscious;
- providing career counselling in the College itself;

- preparing the students for various competitions held at the level of College, University and the State;
- exposing the students to community needs;
- humanizing the students to the social problems by way of organizing social awakening programmes;
- organizing programmes to have direct communications of the students with the men of repute, skill and expertise in their respective fields;
- · creating a competitive spirit among the students;
- · promoting reading habits among the students;

7.2 Inclusive practices

- 7.2.1 What practices have been taken up by the institution to provide access to students from the following sections of the society:
 - a) Socially-backward
 - b) Economically-weaker and
 - c) Differently-abled

The College organizes several activities and programmes under N.S.S. to provide ample opportunities to the socially backward and economically weaker sections of society to have access to the students. A majority of students of the College belong to the socially backward and economically weaker sections of society. The College is conscious of its obligation to cater to the needs of the community and therefore, it is bounden duty of the College to keep in touch with the socially backward, economically weaker and differently-abled sections of the society and humanize

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the students accordingly by organizing various activities in the College and also at the place where NSS camp is held.

- 7.2.2 What efforts have been made by the institution to recruit 1) staff from the disadvantaged communities? Specify?
 - a) teaching
 - b) non-teaching

The recruitment of teaching staff in the Government the State Government Colleges made by recommendations of the U.P. Public Services Commission. So far as recruitment of non-teaching staff is concerned, either the Director of Higher Education fills up the vacancies by transferring the employees from other Government colleges or the Principal is directed to fill up the vacancies by direct recruitment. In the recruitment of teaching and non-teaching staff reservation policy of the State Government is followed according to which 21%, 2% and 27% of the vacancies are filled up from amongst the candidates belonging to the categories of Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes and Other Backward Castes respectively. A 3 % horizontal reservation is provided to the candidates belonging to differentlyabled candidates from each category.

7.2.2 What special efforts are made to achieve gender balance amongst students and staff?

The College is exclusively a women's college and therefore, gender balance does not apply to it. So far as maintaining gender balance in the staff is concerned the College has no role to play in the matter as it is an institution run and managed by the State Government.

7.2.3 Has the institution done a gender audit and/or any gender related sensitizing courses for the staff/students? Give details.

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The College is exclusively a women's college and therefore, gender-related sensitizing courses are not needed to be organized. So far as gender audit of the staff is concerned, the College is not permitted to do so on account of the policy of the State Government which clearly states that there shall not be any genderbias at the working places. However, under the direction of the State Government a Cell comprising all women as its members has been constituted in the College to look into the cases of harassment of women at the working place.

7.2.4 What intervention strategies have been adopted by the institution to promote the overall development of students from rural/tribal backgrounds?

As per the policy of the State Government, the College makes all out efforts to promote the all round development of students belonging to rural areas. The faculty keep in touch with these students round the year and understand their problems. As per the requirement, the faculty organize programmes like tutorials and extra classes to overcome the weaknesses of these students. Special attention is focused on these students during the class-room teaching and they are encouraged to be responsive to the teaching-learning process. The teachers put them to oral questioning in the class rooms more often which they cannot evade and gradually, level of confidence increases in them and they acquire skill in speech and writing.

7.2.5 Does the institution have a mechanism to record the incremental academic growth of the students admitted from the disadvantaged sections?

The incremental academic growth of the students belonging to the disadvantaged section of the society is recorded by the College on the basis of annual examination held by the University.

7.2.6 What initiatives have been taken by the institution to promote social-justice and good citizenship amongst its students and staff? How have such initiatives reached out to the community?

The State Government is alive to the needs of the disadvantaged section of the society and takes several remedial measures for its uplift, accordingly, the College also adopts these measures to promote social justice and good citizenship among its students and staff. Care is taken by the Principal of the College to have good representation of the staff belonging to disadvantaged sections of the society on various Committees of the College. Similarly, no discrimination amongst the students is made on the grounds of caste, creed and religion. However, the students belonging to the disadvantaged sections of the society are taken care of so that they do not lag behind in the process of academic and all round development. Apart from it to infuse a sense of justice and good citizenship among the faculty and the students the lectures of eminent personalities are organized from time to time. Under the NSS activities the faculty and the students have direct communication with the disadvantaged sections of society and organize programmes to create social awareness among them. More than 50% of the total strength of the students belong to the disadvantaged sections of the society therefore, these segments of society are directly benefited.

7.3 Stakeholder relationship

7.3.1 How does the institution involve all its stakeholders in planning, implementation and evaluation of the academic programmes?

The College involves the stakeholders in the following ways:-

- The Principal forms the Committees before the commencement of the academic session, which have adequate representation of faculty and students, for their direct involvement in the planning, implementation and evaluation of the academic programmes;
- The College organizes parents-teachers meet from time to time to invite their suggestions for developmental and academic programmes of the College;
- The public men often visit the College to have direct communication with the faculty and the Principal and their valuable suggestions are noted and accordingly, if possible, these are implemented.

7.3.2 How does the institution develop new programmes to create an over all climate conducive to learning?

The teaching and learning process has undergone a sea change in the present day world. Therefore, it is the need of the hour that innovations are practiced in the teaching and learning process to make it more interesting and motivating. The College strives to bring about a qualitative change in the teaching and learning process and make the atmosphere of the college conducive to learning.

The innovative programmes are evolved out of discussions held among the faculty and the students. The Advisory Committee which contains adequate representation of the students is entrusted the task of formulating plans for academic activities in the College. The students are thus, involved in teaching and learning process and this practice motivates them to show indulgence in the academic pursuits and create an environment most conducive to

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learning. The evaluative process does not spread fear among the students rather they enjoy it while keeping the spirit of competition alive. The open house meets are arranged on all important occasions and the students are allowed to air their grievances freely. Feedback from the students regarding the academic programmes is obtained and the College ensures that it forms the chief components of the developmental programmes.

The College organizes various events/programmes such as seminars, workshops, presentation of papers by the students, quiz, debates, elocution and poster and chart competitions in which the students participate and win prizes. The teachers also undergo various training programmes and whatever they learn there is translated into practice in the College.

7.3.3 What are the key factors that attract students and stake holders, to the institution and result in stakeholder satisfaction?

The key factors of the College that attract the students and the stake holder to College are given here as under:-

- Vision, mission and objectives of the College reach the masses
 by publication of prospectus and through the website;
- The College is determined to take higher education to the needy women of the community and prepare them to face the challenges of the modern world;
- The concerted efforts are made by the College to achieve its goals and objectives and by and large involvement of community is also ensured.
- Environment of the College is eco-centric, neat and clean and most conducive to academic pursuits;
- Discipline is strictly maintained and dress code strictly followed;

- · Infrastructural facilities in the College are of high order;
- · Games and sports facilities are available;
- Big playfield and a rambling campus are added features of the College;
- · Full freeship to all students up to M.A. classes;
- · Fairness and transparency in admission is ensured;
- Faculty of very high quality ensure smooth teaching and learning;
- Participation of students in all the activities and governance of the College is ensured;
- The students get easy access to the Principal to air their grievances;
- Grievance Redressal Céll looks into the complaints and prompt redressal is ensured;
- · Study tours are arranged for the students;
- · Easy access to Library which is being computerized;
- Free access of the students to computers and browsing on internet are ensured;
- · Basic computer literacy is imparted to all students;
- The students join NSS or Rangers' units voluntarily;
- Career counseling provides opportunities to the students for employment;
- The College has communications with the community by way of holding camps amidst them, inviting parents for suggestions and incorporating them into curricular;
- Aspirations of the community are fulfilled as far as possible;
- The annual examinations results are very encouraging;

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- The College has an Alumni Association which acts as the brand ambassador of the College.
- 7.3.4 How does the institution elicit the cooperation from all stake holders to ensure overall development of the students, considering the curricular and co-curricular activities, research, community orientation and the personal/spiritual development of the students?

The College is run and managed by the State Government and it is bound to follow the policies of the Government in letter and spirit. The welfare schemes for students started by the Government are carried out in entirety and the College cannot deviate from them. However, the College is also responsive to the needs and problems of the students and the community. The public men often visit the College and have direct communication with the Principal and the faculty. It is due to persistent demand and cooperation from the stake holders that B.Sc. and subsequently M.A. classes have been started. The students and the faculty are also associated with the stake holders as a plan of the College. The extension programmes are conducted with the help of stake holders. The NSS camp held amidst the community is a potent tool of communicating with the stake holders and eliciting help from them for rooting out evils from the society. The eminent personalities both from governmental and non-governmental agencies are invited to share their knowledge and experiences with the faculty and the students. The curricular and extra curricular activities carried out by the College ensure spiritual and overall development of the students.

7.3.5 How do you anticipate public concerns in your current and future programme offerings and operations?

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The College is committed to build up a society free from social evils/problems of casteism, communalism, corruption, dowry, unemployment, poverty, poor health and sanitation and gender discrimination by educating women of the community who in turn, will contribute to accomplishment of the mission and objectives of the College. Interaction with the community, public men and with persons of repute and experience reflects on the future programmes of the College. The College undertakes the activities which prepare the students to take on the challenges posed by the modernity and global changes.

7.3.6 How does the institution promote social responsibilities and citizenship roles among the students? Does it have any exclusive programme for the same?

The College imparts higher education to the women of the community and therefore, a pious duty is cast upon the College to inculcate a sense of social responsibility and good citizenship among the students. National Service Scheme is an exclusive programme for promotion of social responsibilities and citizenship among the students. The College fulfills its social obligation by:-

- Organizing celebrations in the memory of great statesmen/social reformers/workers to sensitize the students to their social responsibility;
- Carrying out extension activities with the help of the students under NSS namely, pulse polio campaign, protection of environment, social awareness against AIDS, HIV and drug addiction;
- Organizing debates on gender bias and inviting suggestions from the students to get rid of it;
- Creating awareness among the students for rights and duties;

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7.3.7 What are institutional efforts to bring in community-orientation in its activities?

The College holds meetings with the parents/guardians of the students periodically so as to involve them in academic and extension activities of the College. The alumni association is another tool for keeping the community in close contact with the College. Under the NSS the College adopts an area inhabited by the disadvantaged section of the society and carries out extension activities there. Education Kits meant for little children are distributed among the poor children free of cost so as to encourage the little children to go to schools The NSS volunteers visit the slum areas and have interaction with the illiterate poor women and children.

7.3.8 How does your institution actively support and strengthen the neighbourhood communities? How do you identify community needs and determine areas of emphasis for organizational involvement and support?

The College has hutments of very poor people in its immediate neighbourhood. These people dwell on poverty and illiteracy. Besides, a large number of students come from the under privileged class of society. The College has designed a proforma which is attached to the admission form and the candidate seeking admission to the College is required to fill up the proforma and submit it along with admission form. The proforma containing complete information and socio-economic status of the family the candidate belongs to, is separated from the form of the candidate admitted to a Course and an analysis of data is done. In addition to it, the teachers have first hand knowledge of the problems of the students and their families. Thus, on the basis of data available from the analysis and information gathered from the teachers, the College identifies needs and problems of the community. First,

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poverty is the most glaring problem which hits the students and their families hard. As per the policy of the State Government, the female students up to the level of post graduation are imparted free education. In addition to it, the students belonging to under privileged class of society as well as the families of general category living below poverty line are awarded scholarships. Secondly, the education hitherto imparted to these students does not enable them to get employment. The College provides 'O' level of computer education at an affordable cost. Apart from it, basic computer literacy and easy access to internet are available to all students free of cost. A Career Counselling Cell helps the students to get employment. Besides, gender bias, unhygienic living, dowry system many other social needs/problems are prominently debated. To create awareness among the community the College undertakes extension activities under the NSS with the direct involvement of the students and the faculty, and provides logistical support to the community.

The College ensures feedback from the students regarding performance of the teachers, teaching-learning methodology, syllabi covered, creation of interest among the students by the faculty towards learning etc. and determines measures to be adopted to elicit maximum satisfaction from the students. The tutorials and extra classes are held by the faculty to redress the problems faced by the students during class room teaching-

learning. The faculty have direct interaction with the students and do the needful. The College is alive to the current and future educational needs and is prepared to take on the challenges that come in the way of its commitments. The faculty are routinely imparted training at the Academic Staff College and the Administrative Training Institute Lucknow to get up date in the field of teaching-learning process and administration of higher education. The learning and experience so gained are shared by the faculty with the students.

7.3.10 How do you build relationships?

The infrastructural facilities, teacher-taught relationship, academic environment, computer facilities, discipline, extension activities and above all dedicated and devoted faculty and efficient administration are the special features which attract the students to the College and complete their studies. The faculty and the principal are easily accessible to the students and the grievances/problems of the students are promptly taken care of.

The students are in direct contact with their teachers who motivate them for acquiring skill in studies. The problems of the students are remedied in the tutorial or extra classes held by the faculty. The students are put to oral and written tests frequently so that the students get confidence and perform better. Quiz, paper presentation, seminar, essay competition, poster and chart competitions are the practices inducted in the academic

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programmes to make the teaching-learning process interesting and evaluative.

The College always strives for excellence and is determined to meet the expectations of the students. The traditional class room teaching-learning is assisted by the computer based learning. The faculty use modern methods of teaching and the students are allowed to support their reading material with easily accessible and free of cost internet facility. The faculty have communications with the students through 'e'mails. For all round development of the students, the College organizes curricular, co-curricular and extension activities through out the year. The winners in various academic and non academic competitions are awarded prizes in the annual function organized at the end of teaching session.

7.3.11 What is your complaint management process? How do you ensure that these complaints are resolved promptly and effectively? How are complaints aggregated and analyzed for use in the improvement of the organization, and for better stake holder-relationship and satisfaction?

The College employs very effective mechanism to redress the grievances of the students. A complaint box has been installed in the administrative block for registering complaints. The box is periodically opened to collect the complaints/ grievances of the students and the complaints are directly dealt with by the Grievance Redressal Cell headed by a senior teacher. The Cell categorizes the complaints on the basis of finance involved. The complaints which do not involve finance are put before the Principal with suggestions for prompt redressal and those requiring finances at the College level are also resolved soon but those which require financial sanction from higher authorities are subjected to availability of funds. Apart from the students, the stake holders

often convey their grievances/suggestions to the Principal or the faculty directly and if possible, their complaints are also attended to with all sincerity. This practice develops good relationship amongst the stake holders, students and the College.

The candidates who opt Hindi as an optional subject generally have Hindi as their medium of instruction in Intermediate. Most of the girls seeking admission to the College belong to poor or lower middle class families.

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There has been no change in the B.A. Course during the past two years.

Once a candidate is allowed admission to B.A.Part I on the basis of merit in the last qualifying examination, she may elect English as an optional subject. Most of the students belong to poor families and their medium of instruction till the last qualifying examination is Hindi. Obviously, they are not proficient in English and are required to make great efforts to learn English.

No change has been made in the courses during the past two years.

Department wise trends in success rate of students are not available however, that of the B.A. Course as a whole show variation as during the past two years it has been 79.7% and 64.3% respectively whereas the drop out rate is significantly low in B.A. classes.

It is a Degree Department and therefore, no departmental library is available to the students. The students are advised to

consult the Central Library in the light of instructions provided to them by their teacher during the course of teaching. The Department of English has initiated computer assisted learning from the last academic session.

6. Modern teaching methods practiced and use of ICT in teaching-learning

The Department of English has made limited use of computer in the teaching learning process. The third year students have been provided reading material by downloading from the internet and sending it to them through 'e' mails.

The Department of English conducts academic programmes like quiz, essay, elocution competitions etc throughout the academic session and it regularly keeps watch on the academic performance of the students.

The Department of English practices oral session of questioning after a topic has been dealt with so as to have direct feedback from the students regarding their level of performance. The students are perpetually advised to have sound knowledge of English Grammar and their performance is regularly assessed by engaging them in writing answers to the questions given to them during teaching learning process.

 Collaboration with other departments/institutions, at the State, National and International levels and their outcome during the past two years The Department of English carries out academic activities in collaboration with the faculty of the College. It invites teachers from other institutions to deliver lectures on select topics and it provides an opportunity to students to assess and evaluate their own teacher for his performance.

Priority areas for Research and details of the ongoing projects, important and noteworthy publications of the faculty during past two years

The Department of English is yet a Degree Department and it is not permitted by the University to guide thesis for Ph.D. However, the department has carried out a minor research project in the current academic session on Socio-Economic and Linguistic Pattern of the Students in collaboration with the Department of Sociology and Economics.
